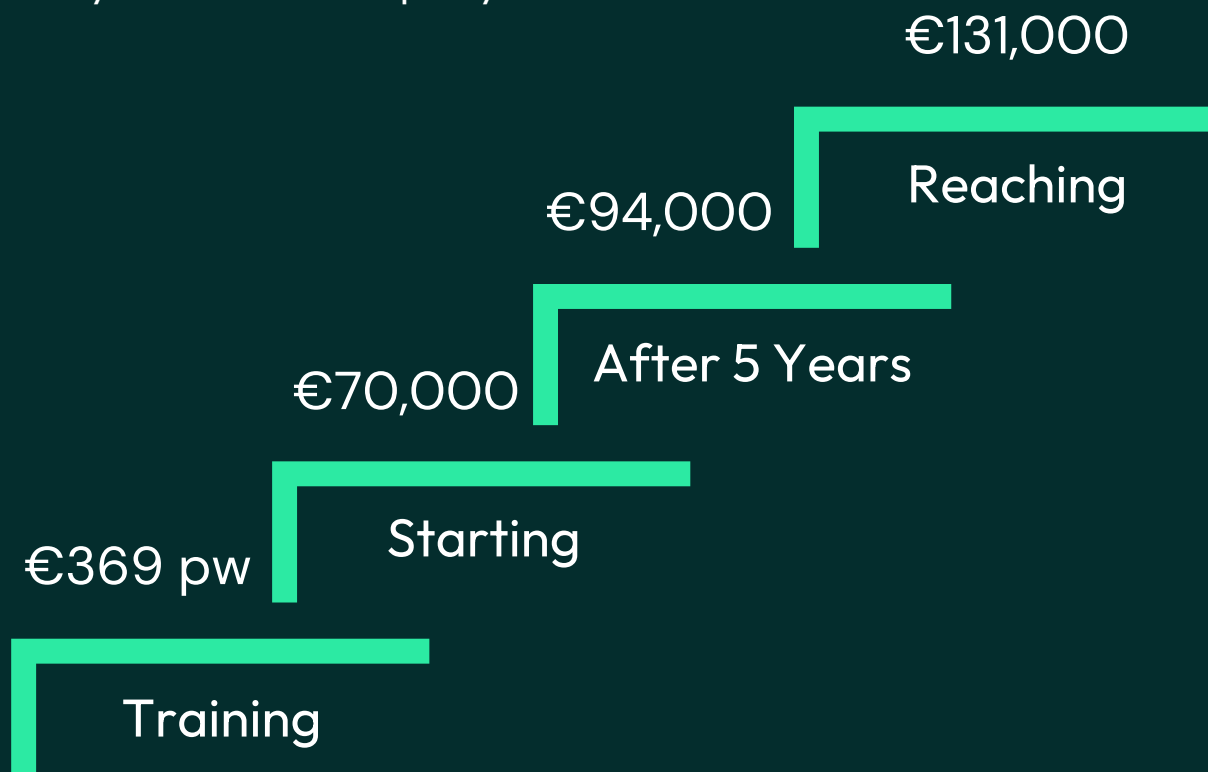
ATC is an opportunity to work in a unique role that few people even consider.

Are you the right person to apply for this career?



Applicants must be at least 19 years of age. (Don't let the age thing put you off as we are working on something new and exciting that will keep you busy in the aviation industry until you are eligible age).



Applicants must have passed at least five subjects in the Leaving Certificate including Mathematics with a Grade H5 in at least two higher level papers or hold a comparable award at Level 5 on the National Framework of Qualifications (NFQ).



Applicants must have a high level of proficiency in spoken English.



What do Air Traffic Controllers do?

An Air Traffic Controller is responsible for the safe, orderly and expeditious movement of air traffic on and in the vicinity of airports and in the airspace for which Ireland is responsible.

Air traffic controllers in Shannon Enroute Centre keep aircraft separated using Radar and talk to the flights through our headsets using VHF radio systems.

Our Radar systems have the latest technology to deal with the future rise in Air Traffic.

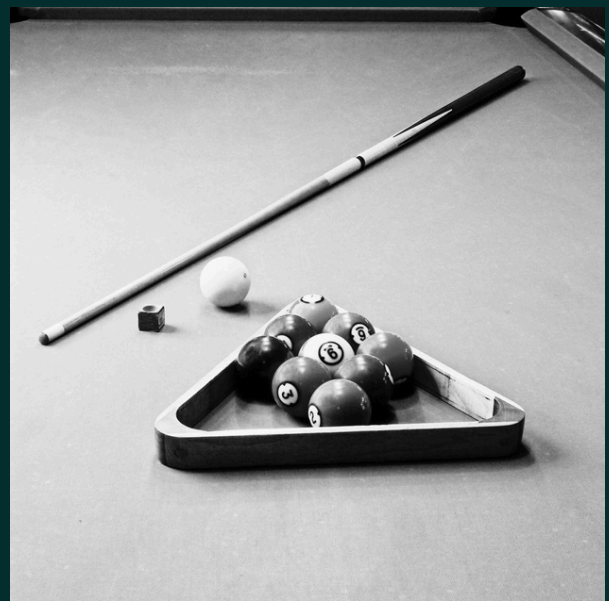


Shannon Enroute Centre

Student Controller Program

The training for the Student Controller Program (SCP) takes place on site in Ballycasey, Shannon, Co. Clare. Length of training takes from 18 months to 24 months from start to on-the-job working.

The training consists of theory and Radar simulation in a training environment. If all modules are successfully completed, training moves to On-the-job Instructor (OJTI) phase in the live environment.

Under the watchful eye of your OJTI, the student tunes all the skills and knowledge they have learned over the last 18 months.

After a predetermined length of time and once the OJTI and the student are happy with their own progress, the student will undergo a final check with an independent assessor.

The Student Controller now becomes a fully qualified Air Traffic Controller and becomes part of a unique team in the aviation world.
